Considering Returning to our Three-Service Schedule: A Note from the Rector

I am wondering, along with quite a few folks from the parish, if we could now return to our full three-service schedule. The reason we changed our schedule was, of course, COVID. We would likely return to something like 8AM and 9AM or (9:15AM) in Zabriskie, followed often by coffee hour and regular forum hours in the Parish Hall, followed by the 11:15 AM in Immanuel, or possibly 8AM and 9AM in Zabriskie and 10:30 AM in Immanuel, although this would make finding a good time for forum hours more difficult. All of our services might look a bit smaller as we first re-start this schedule, but the hope would be that more options would help in bringing more people back to Church. It would also be a move back towards a more "normal" Immanuel schedule. We would still join together as before for major holidays and for Summer. The logistics and various considerations are many: choirs, lectors, Altar Guild, ushers, chalicists, acolytes, two coffee hours, etc., etc., but we should still remember how to do all of this! I invite you to mull this over, pray about it, and be in touch with me with your thoughts and questions. I just wanted you to know that this is an active question, and the secondary question is when to re-start this schedule. Thanks, all!



If you want more contemplation in your life, you are invited to become part of the Benedictine Community at Immanuel. NEW Bible Study, Thursday, November 3rd @ 10:30 a.m. Connecting the Great Prophecies of Daniel and Revelation

The book of Revelation is confusing and, to many, nonsensical! The great reformer John Calvin famously wrote biblical commentary, sometimes dozens of pages on a single word or verse—writing about and 'explaining' every verse in every book... except Revelation. Calvin refused to write about Revelation saying he didn't know what it meant or why it was scripture. And many Episcopalians feel the same way. We don't know what this is, we don't know why we're reading it. Let's talk about something else. But the Thursday Bible study group, hot off Karen Armstrong's book about the history of the Bible, realize that there is a lot of Revelation imagery knit into American culture and Christianity. We'd like to study it, perhaps not to understand exactly what it means, but to see where some of those images come from and what we do and do not believe was revealed to John of Patmos.

As the Episcopal branch of the Jesus movement, we believe we can draw positive lessons for life and spiritual development from any scripture. We approach it all with charity, trying to imagine why so many Christians of each generation have thought this book had something to say about God's deep love and mercy revealed in Jesus. We want to see if we can tease out how and why this is a fitting end to a story of salvation that begins in Genesis, is sung of in the Psalms, and foretold by every prophet. In that spirit, we are embarking on a new study of Revelation that will explore connections with Daniel, the great prophetic book of the Old Testament—which is also a story of a man who has confusing and terrifying visions and does not know what they mean... but surely hopes that they herald the Justice and Mercy of a Loving, Saving, God.
