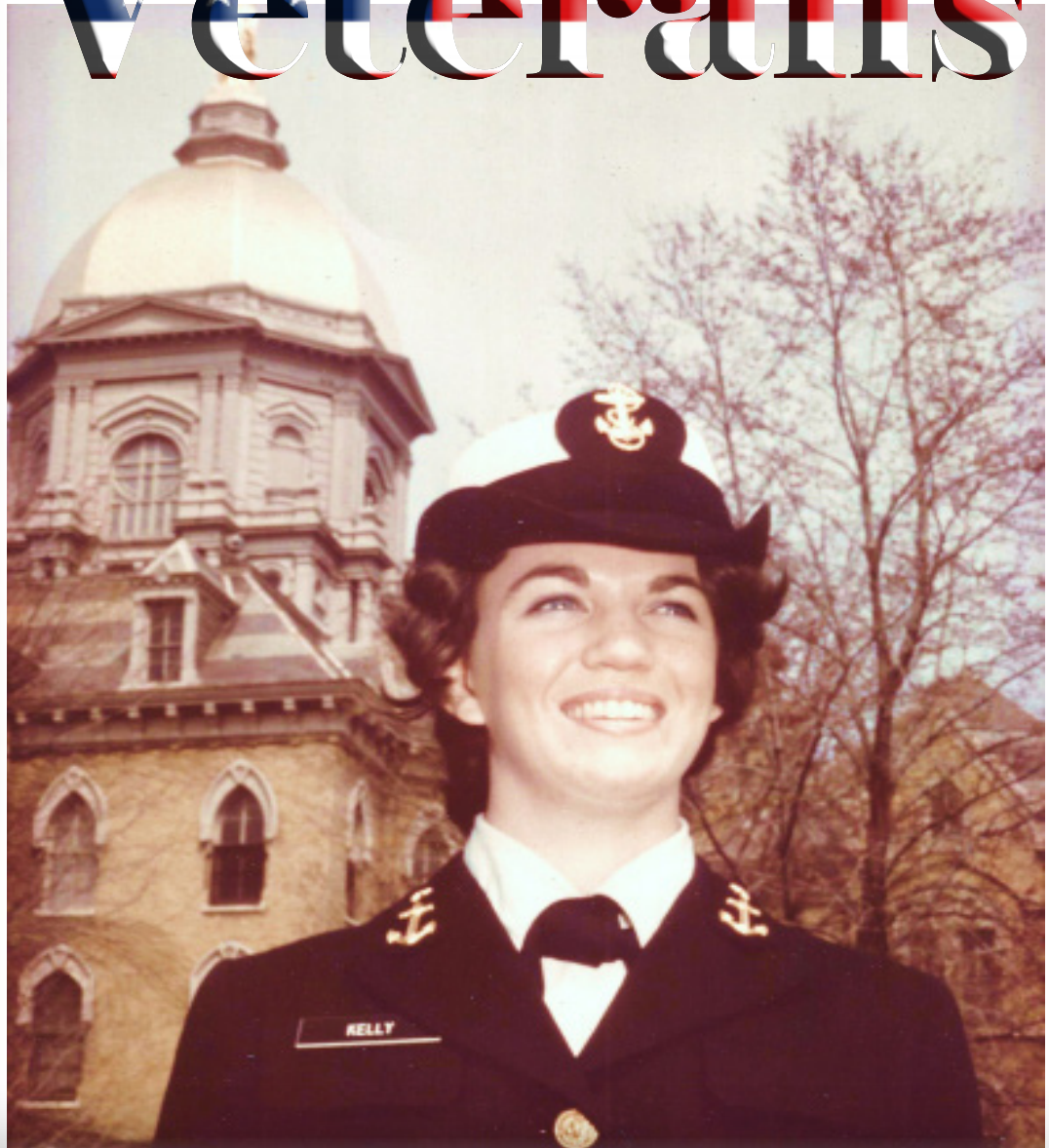

From The Rector

A Letter from the Rector and Vestry

Dear Members and Friends of Immanuel,

“Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being?” (The Book of Common Prayer, page 305)

This is the final of the five questions at the end of the recitation of our Baptismal Covenant regarding how we, as Christians, are called to live out our faith: with firm commitment and a reliance on God’s help. The answer, as you’ve likely heard and said yourself, is “I will, with God’s help.” Every time we say those words, we are called to reaffirm this central tenet of our faith.

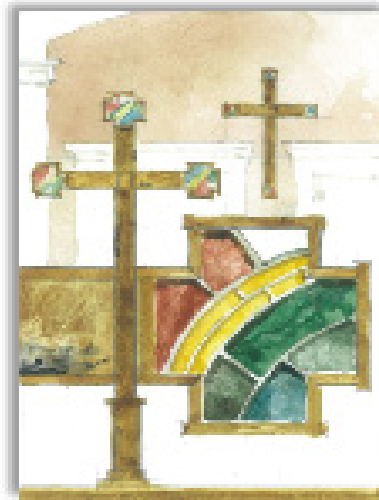
We are each called to answer this question as an individual, but we also have a responsibility as a community to the questions in our Baptismal Covenant. Throughout history, communities of believers have fallen short in our collective effort to strive for justice and peace among all people. The evidence is clearly in front of us that despite the good actions we do take part in, there is still so much more we are called to do.

So, the question at hand is what are we, the community at Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill, called to do, right now, to live more fully into our covenant promise? There are certainly many areas where we serve – our Outreach program immediately comes to mind – but in this moment, it seems that we are being called to do more.

work with the Clergy to raise up a committee of individuals who are interested in helping to shape this ministry area, just as we have committees established and growing to support our other ministry areas. But, inherent in this response is a shared feeling that we are being called to do more, and to be more intentional in our approach to social justice in this time.

We would be lying if we said that the urgency with which we are moving is not in response in part to the national attention on racism currently in the public eye. It’s



certainly made it all the more apparent that we have a serious problem in our country, one which will only be addressed through a collective reckoning of the history of our founding, the systems that have been put in place and reinforced ever since. It would be also be purposely obtuse not to say out loud that those of us who would generally be considered white in the U.S. have a set of shared experiences that do not match those of our brothers and sisters who do not identify as white. Many of us will need to learn a fuller story of the history of our country, and in some cases, unlearn narratives with which we are comfortable. We will all likely need to challenge our own assumptions. We will certainly all need to listen closely to what God is calling us to do in response to what we learn. This will not be a short-lived effort – and it will not solely be focused on the issue of race, as the topic of social justice is much broader. But, we will start here, in response to the needs of the moment, and we will see where we can go, always with God’s help.

This is truly just the very first step in our process, and please keep an eye out for more information from your Vestry and Clergy regarding opportunities to get engaged with Immanuel’s newest ministry area. In the meantime, please contact the Clergy or your Wardens with any questions.

Another Immanuelite for the Military History Books

At a Senior Ministry Luncheon at Goodwin House Alexandria, I learned that Immanuel had a female military history-maker in its midst: Candy Levin was the first woman commissioned in the U.S. Navy via ROTC. As luck would have it, she was standing in the parking lot when I returned to Zabriskie. Candy was quite nonchalant about it; her only comment was on how “they had to order a new commissioning certificate” to change the printed male pronouns to the feminine instead of simply printing her a new certificate for her graduation. Although it took a bit of persuading, she agreed to a sit-down interview, at the conclusion of which she turned the tables and ended-up treating me – the person she was already helping -- to lunch.

“Both parents were military – uniformed services” she begins just after we tucked into a booth at Zoë’s Kitchen on King Street. I quickly realized that she was going to make this interview easy for me.

The Navy “Opened the (ROTC) program to women in 1973 – needed more jobs for the officers to hold. I joined during Vietnam – I’m a Cold War and first Gulf War vet (also).”

A senior in college, Candy Levin did four years of ROTC training in a single, 12-month period – and was the only woman in her class – extremely impressive when you learn that, of the 24 women who went through training around the country, Candy was the only Senior. “...Notre Dame just went co-ed in September of 1972 –it had been an all-male school; all-male ROTC. Once she transferred from St. Mary’s College -- Notre Dame’s sister school next door – she lived on campus in one of two dorms that the university had converted to female housing. “Now here I was in 1973 as a senior...It was the first graduating class of women, too.”

Soon she served as a Communications Watch Officer, a shore-based position for sailors primarily responsible for sending and receiving messages to and from ships for the land-based operational commands. “All of the 24/7 shift watch officers were women.”

Asked about what her experiences were like after graduation – she was sworn-in by her father, Captain Eugene F. Kelly USN – she acknowledged challenges, but only mentioned the positive. “The most-welcoming officer was the Marine Corps officer. Within the first week he had me and three other women in my unit – he and his wife – invited us to a welcome brunch at their home.”

As she began her military career in uncharted territory for a woman graduate, she admitted; “I didn’t know what to expect. I knew what I expected. I expected a professional relationship.” Candy went on to tours of duty in Weapons Program Management and in Joint Intelligence.

I ask what she found most challenging in the beginning; “Probably getting my peers to take me seriously. Guys ran the gamut, from ignoring me, to giving me static, to welcoming me...” She leans slightly forward, eyes wide, then quickly adds “To wanting to date me!”

My last two questions: why did she retire, and would she do it again. She answers the first question quickly, “My commissioning day was May 13, 1974, and I officially retired on August 30, 1995; so twenty-one years.” She pauses for a bit, then adds “It was time (to retire). You just know. It was time.”

Candy’s answer to my final question reveals the only negative to a stellar career without regret. As usual, she starts off with the positive “Seventy-eight percent of the time, I had jobs that I loved”, then later added, “Girls today will go to sea. The need to get warfare training first...” Earlier in our interview, she did tell me “I’ve never served on a ship”, but it didn’t sink in until now.

Being a pioneer in any profession comes with at least one loss, and I truly believe that Candy’s was working in the Navy and missing the opportunity to go out to sea. Let me correct that: if you’re fortunate enough to know Candy Levin’s personality, can-do spirit and insane work ethic, then you’d agree with me that not having her serve on a ship wasn’t a missed opportunity for Candy, it was a missed opportunity for the U.S. Navy.

year, we hope you will consider that option this year, knowing it will be especially appreciated by your parish.

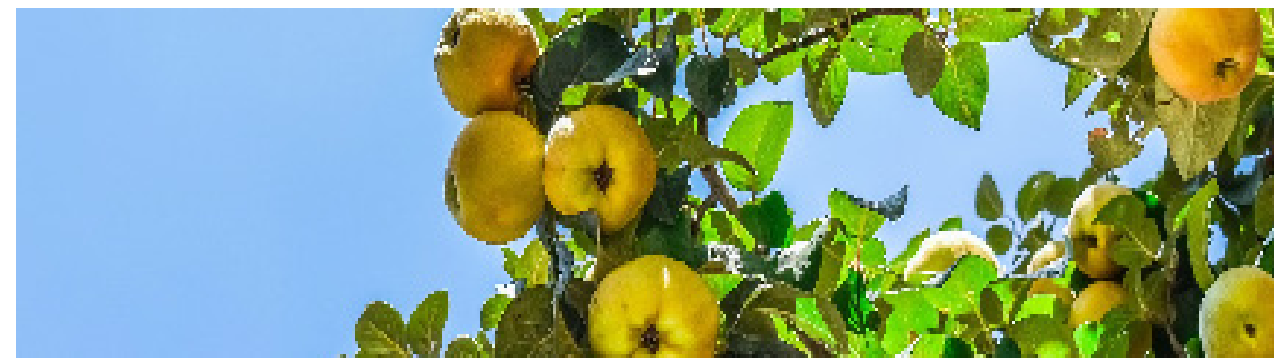

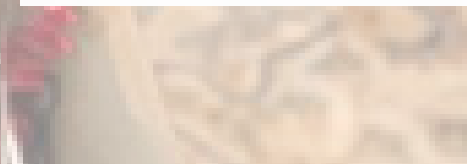
Maybe all will remember we might not be together physically, but it does not mean that we are not spiritually connected.

On June 17th, Immanuel Church-on-the-Hill delivered 60 bagged meals to Christ House in Old Town Alexandria, fulfilling a time-honored tradition of faith-filled service. As part of Immanuel’s annual Outreach program for over twenty years, Immanuelites cook and serve a simple dinner every other month (on the third Wednesday), representing one of numerous churches in the area to participate in this ministry. This June, Lisa and Isabel Frye rose to the challenge, shopping, prepping and delivering the meals single-handedly! To you we say a hearty “thank you!”

Because of Covid-19, Christ House is experiencing a significant increase in Alexandrians needing food assistance. It has also implemented strict sanitation protocols for all volunteers. As a result, it has been necessary to change our approach to meal preparation and serving: normally the meal is prepared on premises, in the Christ House kitchen and served in the adjacent dining room, while nowadays a “take-away” meal is required.

A small but dedicated group of Immanuel volunteers support this ministry*, which is open to all (generally upper high school age and above). For myriad reasons, including that some volunteers have encountered family changes due to the pandemic, there is an open call to those who may wish to join this ministry. 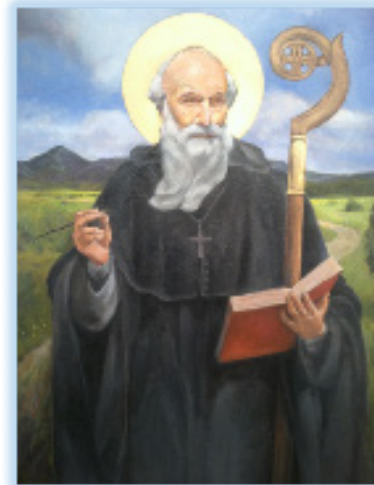
COME AND SEE: A BENEDICTINE COMMUNITY

Yes indeed. A Benedictine Community right here on Immanuel's grounds. Wasn't St. Benedict a 4th century Roman Catholic monk? You say you don't see a stone walled monastery on our grounds? Is it tucked away behind the Memorial Garden? What is a 4th century monk doing at our church?

These are good questions. No, there is no separate monastery. But there is the spirit of that 4th century Monk imbedded here at Immanuel.

I recall when I was at another Episcopal parish many years ago, I saw in the bulletin that parish had a Rule of St. Benedict Community. I never looked into what that group was about because I felt somehow intimidated by its name, by the sense of ancient (not contemporary) behavior, and need I say by the word "rule". I regret now that I didn't at least look into that group because I've found here at Immanuel a Benedictine Community that is not at all intimidating, that is accepting and open, that strengthens my spirituality.

St Benedict of Nursia (c.AD 480-550) wrote a book of precepts in 516 for monks living communally under authority of an abbot, spiritual precepts that have surprising relevancy to our lives today. He spoke of humility, of tradition and community, of listening, of kindness, of calmness and serenity, of stripping away masks and the false sense of self -- precepts that allow each of us to come closer to God.



Immanuel is host to a Benedictine Community and while the majority of the Community's members are Immanuelites, several are from other denominations as well. The Benedictine Community at Immanuel is celebrating it's 10th Anniversary this year -- evidence of its value to its members. The uniqueness of the Community is that it is just that--a community, one that shares. We select short readings to help center us on a topic at each meeting and each person has an opportunity to reflect on that topic as it touches them. The format is unique in that we don't have discussions, but rather reflections: i.e., we don't cross-talk or comment on what someone else has said, and no one is obliged to speak if they don't choose to. No one need fear censure for their reflections. The book used during 2019 and spring of 2020, and that

sustained us through the Pandemic while we met virtually, was Joan Chittister's *Radical Spirit: 12 Ways to Live a Free and Authentic Life*. Another book will be selected for inspiration in the fall.

Following graduation from Glenbard High School in 1942, Philip Burge was drafted into the Army. He tested into the elite Army Specialized Training Program (ASTP) in engineering at the University of Georgia. This fast-track program was designed to award a B.S. in Engineering in 15 months. Philip spent two quarters in ASTP before it was cancelled nationwide in 1944, when it appeared that the U.S. and its Allies could win the war before the students could graduate. Philip and the other University of Georgia students were sent to Camp Gordon for 10th Armored Division training. In September 1944, they landed in Cherbourg, France, and proceeded to fight through France, Luxembourg, Belgium, and Germany.

Philip’s experiences in WWII were life-changing. He was always quietly proud of the success and sacrifices made by all American soldiers during this War. In December 1944, Philip found himself, along with other soldiers of the 10th Armored Division, surrounded by the German

Army in Bastogne, Belgium. The Germans issued an ultimatum to “surrender or be annihilated.” The ensuing battle, Hitler’s last gamble, known as the Battle of the Bulge, was intended to push the Allied forces back to the coast. According to historian Peter Schrijvers in his book, “Those Who Hold Bastogne: The True Story of the Soldiers and Civilians Who Fought in the Biggest Battle of the Bulge,” the plan nearly succeeded, and almost certainly would have, were it not for this one Belgian town and its tenacious American defenders who held back a tenfold larger German force while awaiting the arrival of General George Patton’s mighty “Third Army.”

Philip was honorably discharged in January 1946 and returned to the University of Georgia, which offered him immediate admission and full credit for his ASTP coursework.

subsequent generations. Their service, like the service of all combat veterans deserve our highest honor and upmost respect.

I am privileged to share that I have an understanding of military service from multiple perspectives. My father served in the newly established United States Air Force during the Korean War, and I became a military spouse and a military service member myself, during the Post-Vietnam era when the military took shape as an All Volunteer Force. When the draft ended, less than 2 percent of the active-duty enlisted force was female. Today, approximately 15 percent of the active duty enlisted force, and approximately 16 percent of the Officer Corps is female.

Fellow Parishioners, I appreciate the opportunity to tell my military story.

I come from a family with long established military tradition. My paternal ancestor, Captain Daniel Neil, served under General George Washington, and was killed in the Battle of Princeton on January 3, 1777 fighting for our independence from England, and another maternal ancestor was a prisoner of war during the final stages of the Revolutionary War. These men's service to our country formed a backbone of patriotism that ran through



I and my family thrived in the All Volunteer Force with it's career opportunities that had civilian relevance, good pay, and family friendly quality of life benefits such as good housing, child care, health benefits, family advocacy programs and military stores. Women service members at the time were barred from combat roles, however they and I demonstrated our patriotism and commitment through a willingness to serve.

The United States has nearly 2 million women veterans today, and too often they are overlooked, forgotten or feel invisible. Let's honor all veterans, but be especially mindful of the women veterans in our community, and how we can best thank them for their unique sacrifices and service to our country.

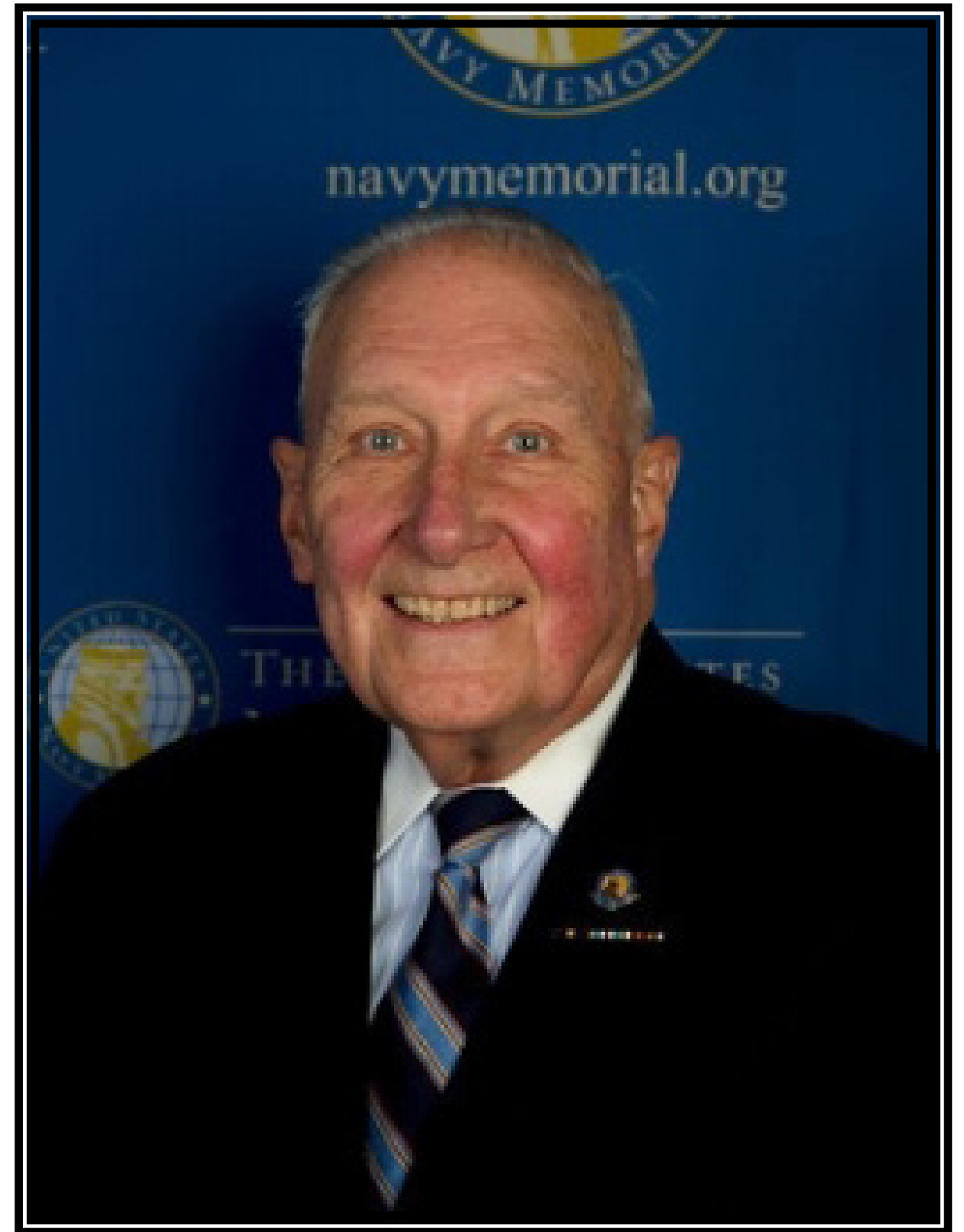

After graduating from the Naval Academy in 1925, Admiral Walker served in battleships until he was “volunteered” for submarine school in 1927. Between 1928 and 1937 he served in a series of submarines: USS R-8 (SS-85), USS R-15 (SS-92), USS R-13 (SS-90), USS S-21 (SS-126), and USS S-31 (SS-136). While skipper of S-21 in the mid-1930s, he was instrumental in the development of the torpedo data computer that proved so successful for fleet submarines during World War II.

He later served on the Pacific Fleet Submarine Force staff, first in gunnery and fire control, and later as operations officer during the early months of the war. He commanded the USS Mayrant (DD-402) during the North Africa invasion, leaving her when she was severely damaged by a German bomb off Sicily. His commands included the attack transport USS Effingham (APA-165), and the oilers USS Elokomin (AO-55) and Canisteo (AO-99). He later commanded Destroyer Squadron 14 and the U.S. Naval Mine Depot, Yorktown before retiring in 1955.

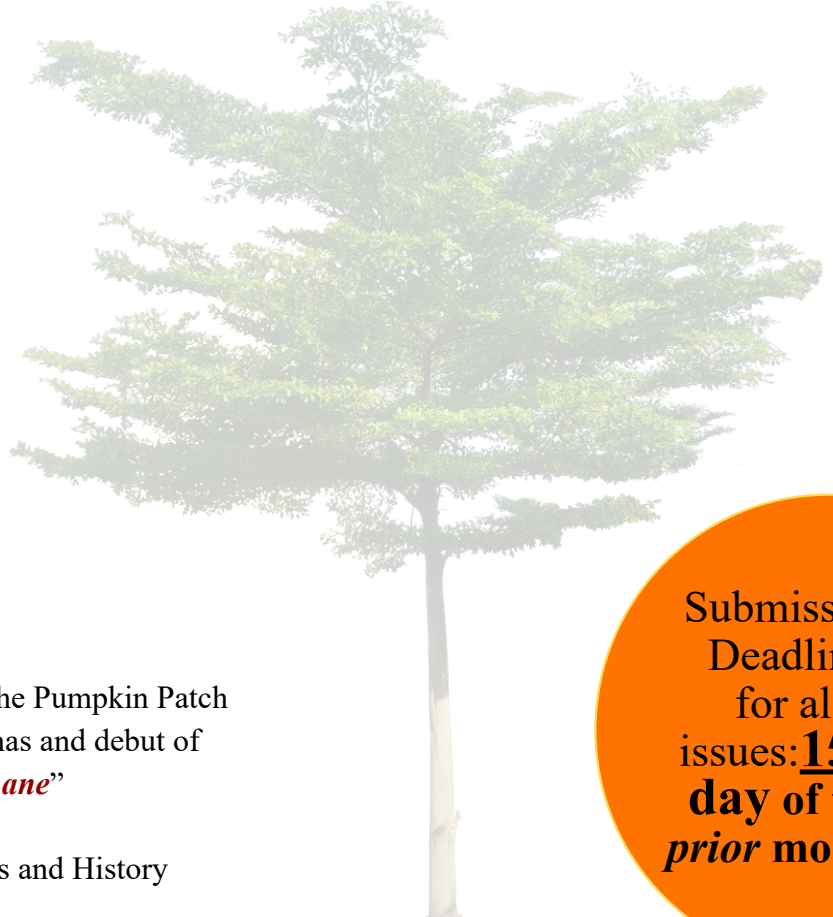
